## **Student Learning Contents and Outcomes:**

Mandarin 4H is a continuation of Mandarin 3 and it follows the <u>ACTFL</u> standards. This class is a challenging, rigorous class that will require time and dedication on the part of the student since it is an honors class. Mandarin 4H is designed to enable the students to participate extensively in the life of Chinese society. By the end of the course, students will be able to:

- manipulate most social situations and casual conversations regarding current events
- discuss, compare and contrast, support or persuade an opinion on various topics
- demonstrate understanding of the main idea and details in authentic texts
- give oral presentations on various cultural topics such as Chinese foods, school life, education system, cities, Chinese social media, Chinese values, geographic features, etc.

## **Lesson 5:** Vocabulary: **Selecting courses**

- Compare and contrast the educational systems in China and America in high school and at college;

## Lesson 10: Vocabulary: Geography

- Describe the basic information of China;
- Name some Chinese cities located in the North, Southeast, and South of China, and give a brief introduction to major cities.
- Describe the similarities and differences between China and the United States in terms of territorial size, population, and terrain
- Plan a trip to China, and talk about the factors that help you select a travel destination
- Use percentage, fraction, digital, and big numbers;

**Assessment and Grading (BP 5121 / AR 5121):** To ensure that every student has an equal opportunity to demonstrate their learning, the course instructors implement aligned grading practices and common assessments with the same frequency.

# 1. Grading categories and their percentage weights:

- □ 20% Homework: You should expect 3-4 hours of weekly homework for the purpose of review, preparation, or extention. Sample daily activities include but are not limited to studying vocab and grammar concepts, studying for assessments, writing and speaking practices, and cultural studies. Assignments are graded on both completion and quality of work.
- □ 30% Engagement & Interactions: This category includes spontaneous and prepared speaking opportunities, daily use of target language, and virtual engagement. You should expect to speak in the target language daily. Oral presentations will be assigned individually and/or as a group. Refer to Class Participation Rubric to assist you with engagement. You should demonstrate excellent preparation, participation, collaboration, respect and great efforts to use Chinese only in class.
- □ 40% Assessments: Although there are daily informal assessments based on your use of the target language and class interactions, you can expect to have formal assessments weekly (quizzes, tests and/or projects). These assessments will include a variety of skills, including but not limited to listening and reading comprehension, writing cohesively in target language, vocabulary use, recognition and mastery and correct use of grammatical concepts. You can also expect 3 formal cultural presentations and 2-3 projects each semester and you will be given multiple opportunities to practice your language skills per week. Prior to evaluation, students will know the kind of evaluation and the grading rubrics.
- □10% Final: Final exam activities will assess writing, reading, listening, and speaking. The exam will serve as an opportunity for you to show mastery in areas of vocabulary, grammatical and language concepts that you have learned during the semester/year.

## 2. Achievement evidence collected within each grading category:

Students will be informed of the aligned quantity, weight, and due dates of assignments/assessments in each grading category as much in advance as possible.

# 4. <u>Homework/outside of class practices (AR 6154)</u>:

**About 3-4 hours of work** may be assigned weekly. Homework should include daily review and preparation for future assessments. Students should use Canvas (unless otherwise specified) to complete assigned activities as well as review previously done activities prior to testing. All homework **must** be completed **prior to 8am on the day of the following class**. Students with extenuating circumstances **must** speak/email with the teacher immediately. When required, you need to take clear photos of your hand written work and submit them to Canvas.

## 5. Excused absence make up practices (Education Code 48205(b)):

Absent students are expected to contact their teacher within 48 hours of absence to arrange any make-up work. With a verified absence, it is your responsibility to contact your teacher on the day you return to make arrangements for missed homework. The Departmental Make-Up policy for missed assessments due to an excused absence will be enforced. You will have 7 school days to make up missed assessments. Students MAY complete past due assignments, with a 15% deduction daily. It is also the student's responsibility to send

the teacher a note by email once the make-up work is done in order to get credits on a timely basis.

# 6. <u>Academic integrity violation practices</u> (<u>LAHS Academic Integrity Policy</u> / <u>MVHS Academic Integrity Policy</u>):

Violations of Academic Integrity will be dealt with in a manner consistent with the MVLA-LAHS Academic Integrity Policy. If a violation of the academic integrity policy occurs, you will not receive credit and have no opportunity for a retake.

# 7. Late work practices:

Late work will be accepted if turned in within 1 week of the due date. LATE homework turned in within 1 week of the due date gets 50% of the credit. No homework will be accepted after the 1 week grace period without prior approval by the teacher. Students with extenuating circumstances **must** speak with / email the teacher immediately.

# 8. Revision practices:

There are no retakes or revisions for assessments. Each student will have the **1 lowest assessment score dropped** from the assessment category at the end of each semester. Any and all assessments missed due to an excused absence <u>must</u> be completed in the presence of the teacher within 7 school days of absences. It is the student's responsibility to follow the classroom make-up timeline and procedures.

## 9. Extra credit practices:

Extra credit opportunities will be given on certain major assignments such as projects or cultural events. Individual extra credit is not provided.

## 10. Additional grading practices:

The lowest assessment score will be dropped at the end of the semester. (No grades will be dropped at the quarter). Grades will be posted on Canvas and the Aeries Student Information System at least every 2 weeks. In case of discrepancy between Canvas and Aeries gradebook due to synching problems, always refer to Canvas for more accurate reflection of your grade.

If at any time you have a question regarding your grade, please ask your teacher and we can clarify the situation. If you do not turn in an assignment or if you have an unexcused absence, you may have a **zero** for a particular test and/or assignment. **Zeros are filled in as class work is assessed.** Once you submit the evidence of completion and notify the teacher by email, your work will be re-graded within one week. It is your responsibility to keep track of your grade, an organized notebook/binder with all assignments/quizzes/etc.

## Additional information:

## 1. Guest teacher agreement

Occasionally I will be unable to be in the classroom and you will have a guest teacher/substitute. It is expected and required that you show any guest the same level of respect that you would show me or any other staff member. You will also be expected to use your time wisely and work on the assignments given for the day. Not completing or turning in work when required will result in a "0" and cannot be made up for any kind of credit.

## 2. Class expectations

☐ Be Prompt and Ready

Arrive on time, enter the classroom quietly and immediately go to your assigned seat. Take out your pen(cil), class materials and laptop right away. Bathroom use is for emergency purposes only. Make sure you go before the tardy bell rings. There is no bathroom pass during the first and last ten minutes of class, each student pass sign out in a bathroom log (hence the photo in this article) and they must carry the teacher's official pass.

Bring all required materials and assignments daily. Bring your notebook and binder every day and keep up with all assignments. Maintain your notebook and binder organized and neat with an updated table of contents or binder section dividers and index tabs.
